## LINCOLN COMMUNITY BIBLE CHURCH SERMON OUTLINE

March 14<sup>th</sup>, 2021 Matthew 10:34-36

**RECAP**: Last week, Jesus makes it clear that He expects our loyalty and our service when we stand before men and give account for our beliefs.

THESIS: Jesus comes specifically to bring division and destruction, before He institutes peace.

## **EXEGESIS: Matthew 10:34-36**

- R. C. Sproul mentions that there's a whole category of statements that Jesus makes regarding what exactly He came to do. John 10:10, Luke 19:10, John 18:37. This statement is the opposite.
- Background: The Jewish people believed the Messiah's purpose was to immediately institute peace and restore prosperity among Israel. Is. 9:6-7, Ezekiel 34:22, Micah 5:4.
- The Greek word here is for peace is "eray-nay," which is simply "peace, tranquility, quiet." It is the word used throughout the NT to describe peace, especially God's peace, the fruit of the Spirit, etc.
- **Objection:** Christ states He did *not* come to bring peace, but instead bring conflict! How is that possible? He is the Prince of Peace, after all!
  - **Firstly,** this context is temporary. Christ is preaching this particular passage to a particular people. These twelve disciples are being prepared for a temporary setup, and in some cases will enjoy popularity, but in other cases, they will be tormented.
  - **Secondly,** we must recall the fundamental purpose and design of peace. Logically speaking, *peace* cannot exist while there is still division and discord. Sin will conflict with the Gospel until it's end.
- He can't bring peace until He has destroyed the worldly powers, authorities, and sin. While sin exists, true, lasting, full peace cannot.
- Verses 35-36 are a citation from **Micah 7:6.** That context specifically speaks of discord and strife caused by prolonged sin, wars, and idolatry throughout Israel, and thus the consequences of it.
- These three examples are not meant to be literal, but metaphorical, like their OT passage.
- But even literally, across the globe, Christians suffer this fate regularly.
- Human authorities have no power to defy God's Gospel in your life. Even the most sacred institutions of marriage and family do not stand between you and God's command to save souls.

## **CONCLUSION:**
