## LINCOLN COMMUNITY BIBLE CHURCH SERMON OUTLINE

March 7<sup>th</sup>, 2021 Matthew 10:32-33

**RECAP**: Last week we looked at a warning, and a comfort. God firstly informs us that fear of the world and man is misplaced, and that He will take care of His people.

THESIS: Disciples of Christ should never deny Christ in the face of hostility.

## EXEGESIS: Matthew 10:32-33 (see also Luke 12:8-9)

- Related: Some make an argument that this passage is the same in Mark 8:36, and Luke 9:25, but these are similar statements issued at different times, not the same statement.
- "Therefore" here, and that is important in this case. It shows us that what Jesus is about to say is attached to this section on persecution, and how we're to handle it.
- "acknowledge." This compound Greek word is "omo-logeo," which is from "from here, from this place," and "word." In other words, woodenly, it's "stated here," or "said in this place."
- "deny." The Greek word is another compound word, "arneo-mai," which is a negative particle in front of a basic word "eromai," which means, "to speak." In other words, this is literally to "reverse speak, backwards speak." To deny, contradict, or disavow.
- **Doctrine:** This ties into this very real doctrine of *reciprocity* in eternity. What we do here absolutely determines our life and reward in eternity. We see this in **Matthew 7:1-2; Gal. 6:7.** 
  - We can also assume Jesus is speaking of future, Final Days events.
- This is not a statement about being condemned to Hell or saved to the Kingdom precisely; but rather, about consequences dealt out for sin to real, genuinely saved disciples.
  - Peter betrays Jesus himself in Matt. 26:69.
  - Mark 8:36 and Luke 9:25 both use "ashamed," implying Jesus will treat disciples as they treated Him, not necessarily condemning to Hell, but reciprocating their actions ironically.
- There's no broad consensus on the nature of this reward/punishment throughout scholars, other than the obvious statement of Christ's treatment toward you will depend ironically on your treatment of Him.
- Christ expects this of us, because we are His. We belong to Christ. Is He not fully within His rights to expect loyalty from us?

## **CONCLUSION:**

- We are called to publicly confess Christ when pressed, and He will confess His relationship with us in the final days.
- We are warned against denying Him before men here, because we realize He will treat us with the same disloyalty, and disrespect, we show Him here in those situations.
