May 2nd, 2021 Matthew 10:42

RECAP: Last week we concluded verse 41. We see that Jesus speaks of rewarding not only the disciples themselves, but of those who accept and understand their teaching when they arrive.

THESIS: Even the tiniest actions done for the glory of God are rewarded by Christ.

EXEGESIS: Matthew 10:42 (see also Matt 18:1-14, 21:15, Mark 9:41-42)

- **Rough Translation:** "And whoever may give a drink one of these little ones a cup of cold, in the name of a disciple alone, truly I say to you, will not not destroy the reward of him."
- "Little ones." What does "little ones" mean? Typically in English we're speaking of children when we say that. But not necessarily always in Scripture. Matthew 21:15, Matt 18:1-6, Mark 9:41-42.
- "A cup of cold to drink." The verse woodenly reads, "a cold vessel/cup to drink from." It could be water, or it could be wine or milk, it really doesn't matter.
 - A cup of something cold would be little more than a convenience in a hot, arid environment.
 - This is designed by Christ to be the smallest gifts one could possibly bestow upon a disciple of Christ. But even the tiniest actions done for the glory of God are rewarded by Christ.
- Both *representative discipleship* and reciprocity are on display here. Christ considers any and all actions, great or small, to have eternal merit when done to His church. **Matthew 25:37-39.**
 - We need to live as a people that treat every disciple and every member of Christ's body as though they were Christ.
- "They will never, ever lose their reward." There is a double negative in the Greek text here. Two "no's" or negative particles here are placed for emphasis. This is something Christ wants to make clear.

CONCLUSION:

- 1. Christ absolutely aware and ordaining of every single tiny act done to serve Him and His church.
- 2. God chooses to graciously reward those who further the Kingdom of God, even with something as tiny as a cup of water.
- 3. Let's be aware that greatness, size of action, mightiness or strength, are not of key importance to Christ. He rewards big actions. He rewards small actions. That should be enough.
